

On account of the great drought, the water supply from the wells was insufficient, and we made arrangements with the Water-works Company to supply the Asylum with water for domestic and fire purposes, for which we pay \$140.00 per annum, including a hydrant. We also bought 300 feet of fire hose, at a cost of \$270.00, as the Asylum is distant from a fire station, and much damage could be done in case of a fire, before the firemen could reach the Asylum. It was necessary to build a granary, and as we had not sufficient room to store the farm machinery, we erected a two-story building, the lower part of which is used for storing farm machinery, and the upper story for granary. As most of the out-buildings were not insured we took additional insurance on buildings and stock, so that the Asylum property is insured, as follows:

The five patients at the Asylum from Calumet County were removed to Outagamie County, where a new Asylum has been erected the past year. We are very much pleased to be able to report that Mr. Mueller, as Superintendent, and

Mrs. Mueller, as Matron, have filled their respective positions with credit to themselves and to the County, as it is due to their circumspection and untiring efforts that our Asylum ranks as one of the first among the County Asylums of the State.

Mr. and Mrs. Mueller have been unanimously re-elected to their positions.

Dr. F. S. Luhman has attended to the duties of his office with the usual punctuality, and he was also re-elected as Physician. We refer you to his report as to the sanitary condition of the Asylum.

The amount due from the State for the keeping of the insane is \$10,348.24. The amount on hand in the Asylum treasury is \$5,803.47, and we would respectfully recommend that the sum of \$5,000.00 from the amount due from the State be appropriated to the Asylum fund, and the balance of \$5,348.24 to the general fund. We annex list of orders drawn, list of inmates, receipts from sale of farm produce and labor, list of farm produce and provisions on hand, and employes and salaries paid, and physician's report, all of which we respectfully submit to your careful examination.
