

The State Board of Control disallowed from the claim made by the Superintendent the sum of \$249.41, claiming that the names of some of the patients for whom board was charged were not on their books. Members of the State Board who visited the Asylum since have convinced themselves from the books of the Superintendent that his report was correct; but as the State Board had already made their report to the Secretary of State, the sum deducted will pass to the credit of the County and will be paid next year. Consequently we will receive this year from the State the sum of \$12,438.55 instead of \$12,687.96, as claimed by the Superintendent.

Your Trustees caused the attic at the Asylum to be finished into bed rooms which gave room for 15 patients. At the suggestion of the attending physician we caused an investigation of the water-closets and the sewers with which they are connected. Several changes were made which materially improved the sanitary condition at the Asylum. The recommendations contained in the report of the attending physician will have our prompt and careful consideration. The death rate the past year was exceptionally high, three having died of consumption of the lungs, three of epileptic convulsions, five of general debility, three of paralysis of the heart, two of brights disease. None of the deaths were caused by contagious disease. Mr. and Mrs. Mueller have discharged the duties of their respective stations with the usual circumspection. The patients were provided with sufficient and wholesome food, and received all possible care, and at the same time the strictest economy was exercised in every branch of the institution of which the favorable financial report for the past year bears evidence. It affords us pleasure to be able to report that the State Board of Control have expressed themselves in the highest terms in regard to the manner in which the patients were cared for, and the management in general. Mr. and Mrs. Mueller were re-elected by unanimous vote. Dr. F. S. Luhman has attended to the duties of his office with the usual punctuality and promptly attended to all calls made outside of his regular visits, and has done all in his power to relieve the suffering of his unfortunate patients. He was re-elected by unanimous vote. We annex list of inmates, orders drawn, receipts from sale of farm produce, farm produce on hand, list of employees and salaries paid, and report of attending physician. All of which we submit to your careful consideration.

REPORT OF PHYSICIAN.

To the Trustees of the Manitowoc County Insane Asylum:

GENTLEMEN:—The sanitary condition of the Asylum since the last year is not as good as might be desired. Many of the old people have been sick and died. Through faulty plumbing, sewer gas from the water closets has escaped into the building and caused diphtheria of a malignant type among the female attendants, and by them was communicated to the children of the Superintendent. Disinfectants have been employed, but it is doubtful whether the building is free from diphtheritic germs. If sewer gas is further allowed to escape, there is great danger of a typhoid fever epidemic among the inmates. I would strongly recommend to put the water closets outside of the building and have covered walks lead to them, so that foul gases could escape outside.

Your attention is called to certain insane people who are allowed the freedom of our streets. It would be wise to restrain them from coming into the city, unless by special permit of the Superintendent. Most people are afraid of cranks; although entirely harmless, when annoyed they might do harm.
