Number of weeks board furnished, 6,082, or \$1 71 per capita per week.

In the item \$616.15 Incidental Expenses, is included the sum of \$584.25 paid for insurance on Asylum property for the next 3 and 5 years. As the insurance covers only a few weeks of the past year, it can not properly be charged to the expense account of the past year, as also the sum of \$374.00 paid for furniture for the new building. We therefore deducted both amounts from the amount expended the past year, showing the actual cost of keeping the patients the past year to be \$10,415.62. The State Board of

Control allowed the sum of \$249.41 which they disallowed last year, and this amount is included in the \$4,971.64 due the county in our report. The Secretary of said Board informed your Trustees that the different amounts in our report, as due from the State, had been allowed in full.

Your Trustees ascertained that Mr. Wm. G. Lueps is guardian for Barth. Hilbert, who has been kept at the Asylum since its organization. That the said Wm. G. Lueps is in possession of about \$1,050.00 belonging to the said Barth. Hilbert, according to the guardian's report to the County Judge. Your Trustees filed a bill with the County Judge for the keeping of said Barth. Hilbert for \$1,209.00. As no hearing could be had up to date, we are unable to report how much of the claim will be paid. We will give the matter our strict attention.

The State Board of Control notified your Trustees that from and after the 1st day of October, 1894, the State will not make any allowance for the keeping of the Idiots at the County Insane Asylum. Your Trustees are of the opinion that Idiots are not a proper county charge and respectfully request your honorable body to cause an investigation of the matter, and to ascertain to whom the cost of keeping such Idiots is chargeable and to instruct your Trustees accordingly.

In accordance with your instructions and with the advice of the Committee on Public Improvements we caused an addition to the Asylum to be built, 40x18 feet three stories high, at a cost of \$1,099.89. The lower floor of the new building is fitted up for a hospital room and sitting room. The second and third floors for bedrooms. As objections were raised against having the carpenter shop in the Asylum building, we caused a carpenter shop and hen house to be built. The building is 46x20 ft., built of brick, is one story high and cost \$205.09. The yield on the farm the past year was satisfactory with the exception of the potatoes.

The Superintendent and Matron attended to their various and arduous duties with their usual circumspection. The patients receive careful attention and are well provided with food and clothing. Mr. and Mrs. Mueller were re-elected to their respective positions for the ensuing year. The State Board of Control visited the Asylum in a body, and after a thorough inspection, expressed themselves as satisfied with the management in general and of the treatment of the patients in particular, which is proved by the fact that they keep our Asylum filled to its utmost capacity. Dr. F. S. Luhman has proved an attentive and efficient officer; he was re-elected for the ensuing year. We refer you to his report regarding the sanitary condition of the Asylum. We annex list of inmates, orders drawn, receipts from farm produce sold and on hand, list of employees and salaries paid, and physician's report. All of which we submit to your careful consideration.

REPORT OF PHYSICIAN.



To the Board of Trustees of the Manitowoc County Asylum for the Chronic Insane :

GENTLEMEN:—During the past year the general health of the inmates has been good, which is mainly due to the quality and variety of diet furnished the patients, and the open door system. With the exception of La Grippe there have been no epidemics or contagious diseases. The cases of sickness demanding attention have been mostly of a constitutional character. Fore most of these is consumption, which can be traced in all cases to a hereditary taint. The mental condition of the inmates shows a slight improvement. The following deaths have occurred:

- Anna Arnold, aged 63, January 3, La Grippe.
- Robert Cummings, aged 37, January 13, Quick Consumption.
- Charlotte Pergandes, aged 83, February 4, Dropsy.
- Frank Tadyck, aged 22, February 10, La Grippe.
- John Kurzuisky, aged 43, March 2, Quick Consumption.
- Guirstein Polsen, aged 74, March 9, Fractured Skull.
- Michael Cummings, aged 22, April 12, Tuberculosis.
- Margaret Carey, aged 80, June 2, General Debility.
- Catherine Fielding, aged 64, June 3, Consumption.
- Tillman Grosshuesh, aged 45, September 9, Drowned in Manitowoc River.
