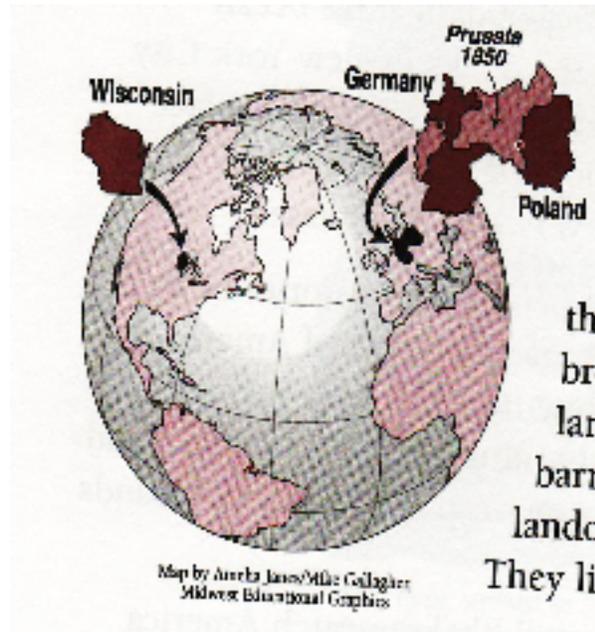

## TOOLS of the TRADE

(several of 21 listed in article)

1. Blank charts and worksheets:  
pedigree charts/family group sheet
2. Research binder: for copies of charts and sheets named in #1
3. Storage: notebook paper/archival-quality protectors, manila folders, flash drives, CD's
4. Computer access: although you still do your sleuthing the old-fashioned way, a computer will revolutionize your record keeping and records accessibility
5. Software: collected data saved in a database
6. Internet access and an e-mail account: to connect to the world-wide records
7. Library card: interlibrary loan, remote access to census records, for instance, to HeritageQuest.com
- 8.. Basic genealogy how-to books and user manuals
9. Scanner/digital camera
10. Cemetery kit: cleaning tools and rubbing wax
11. **SOCIETY MEMBERSHIP:** network of genealogy research benefits.

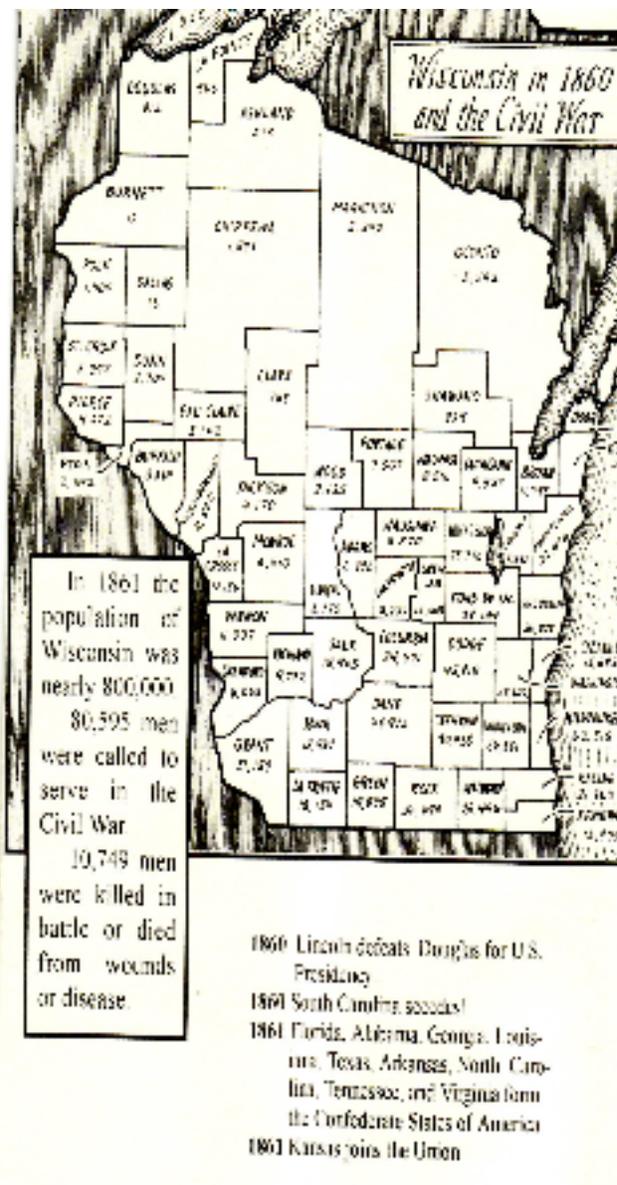
## STANDARD ISSUE

- 1400s - *Family Tree Charts:* from 15th century France where historians indicated lines of descent with three branched lines
- 1845 - *Genealogical Societies:* New England Historic Genealogical Society
- 1894 - *Family History Library:* natural outgrowth of Latter Day Saints emphasis on family history
- 1969 - *Genealogy Conferences:* first conference in Salt Lake City
- 1979 - *Family Tree Software:* many programs, continually improved
- 1981 - *Digital Cameras* - huge impact
- 1984 - *Message Boards* - shared info
- 1996 - *Email Newsletters* - huge savings for societies to 'get the news out'
- 2000 - *DNA Testing:* "set genealogical world on fire."

### **SORTING COUNTY HISTORY DETAILS**

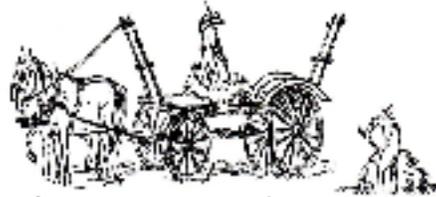

"Found an ancestor's biography in a county history? Watch out - these entries were usually submitted directly by the family and subject to very little fact-checking. So how can you be sure of the facts?:

1. Grab a blank pedigree chart -enter the info from the county history - compare with your earlier records
2. Look in the census
3. Expand to other records
4. Look for published family tree
5. Fact-check with a newspaper."

In the early years, the hand pitchfork was the universal tool for getting hay onto the wagon and from the wagon to the mow or stack. Beginning in 1890, some farmers used hay loaders to reduce the time and labor required to get their hay from the fields into the large

barns they soon built. Horse power was used to lift great fork-fuls of hay into the loft, or second story of the barn, where it was stored for use in the winter.
